# ARTS & CRAFTS



### Collage / Graffiti Collage - Collage ideas / Graffiti collage ideas

This activity can vary from the very simple for younger ages to the more complex for older students.

You can get your student to make a **collage** to reflect something they enjoy. It may be their favourite pet, music, book or TV character or holiday spot...the list is endless if they use their imagination.

Older students can take it further with a **graffiti collage** using an idea about something that is happening in the world, a favourite poem or song or just how they are feeling at that moment. Let them turn the words into pictures and use lots of movement and colour.

### You Need

- A selection of newspapers and magazines.
- Different sorts of paper including tissue, crepe, shiny etc.
- Miscellaneous objects e.g. wool, string, buttons, cloth, glitter etc.
- Paints and brushes.
- Glue and scissors.
- Marker pens.

#### Method

- Before your student starts encourage them to think carefully about the subject they would like to work with.
- Draw any outlines with a pencil.
- They can use words too so get them to decide if they will cut them out, write or paint them or use a mixture of all three.
- Create their collage.
- Send a photo of their creation to their learning advisor.

### Hello from Adele...

# Are you a new supervisor? Do you have any questions that you would like answered?

Starting out as a new supervisor can be both exciting and confusing. It takes time to understand your role and to learn how to manage your new workload. Your student's learning advisor will help guide you and answer any questions you may have.

Other supervisors often have useful advice to share. Recently Dianne, an experienced supervisor, gave this advice to a couple of new supervisors:

A new supervisor recently contacted me as she was feeling overwhelmed with the amount of work being posted to her students.

This is not expected to be done all at once and it is quite normal to have a few weeks worth of work on hand. Often there may also be back orders that come at the same time. Allocate a cupboard for resources and keep the work in there in the order that it comes and do one pack at a time. This sense of being overwhelmed is quite common for new supervisors and if you feel that it is all a bit much at times then don't hesitate to contact your student's learning advisor or Adele Harris for assistance. They are there to guide you and make your role as supervisor a pleasant one.

Another recent query to Dianne was regarding a student's inability to do multiple subjects in a day although they were happy to do one subject all day.

If this is the way your student copes with their schoolwork then let them be. It is better to do one subject at a time thoroughly than to not get any work done at all. As long as they get the week's work completed within that week it doesn't really matter how they do it. That's the beauty of distance learning ... there are no set rules and it can be designed to suit each student and bring out the best in them!
